The First Kinetic Conveyance Contest ~ May 3, 1980

The Contest started in Niwot with a pancake breakfast and the inspection of the entries.



Where it all began.



I just knew that question would come up. Where did the idea for this insanity originate? Wouldn't you know it'd be in California?

It all began on Mother's Day, 1969, in the small hamlet of Ferndale, California (get out those maps, it's near Eureka). Metal sculptor Hobart Brown was welding together a tall, red pentacycle for his son Justin. Artist Jack Mays pronounced the contraption laughable and, with typical one-up-man-ship announced his own intentions to build a better sculpture. In fact, he is quoted as saying, "I'll build a kinetic sculpture and we'll race them." Other friends joined in. On Mother's Day morn, a handful of sculptures assembled on Main Street to the cheers and jeers of onlookers.

In succeeding years the race has grown, outdistancing even the fondest hopes of race founder Hobart Brown.

The years 1970-1973 saw more and more participants in the annual event with names that will live into infamy — "Tyronosaurus Rust," "Red Bird," "Rickety Chicadee," and the all time local favorite, "Ferndale Area Rapid Transit"

In 1974 the race was expanded to surrounding Humboldt County. Field's Landing, a local fishing port, would be the launch site for the cross-country Kinetic Sculpture Race.

The race grew and grew until ...

The 1980 Arcata to Ferndale Cross Country Kinetic Sculpture Race, 77 sculptures racing over a thirty-four mile course in a three day event over land

and swamp from Arcata to Ferndale.

And now, the first annual WANO-COORS Light Kinetic Conveyance Contest is about to begin.


