Here is a description of this position:

Niwot Historical Society Webmaster Volunteer

The webmaster should be experienced in maintaining a WordPress website. Manage WordPress plugin configuration and updates. Frequently monitor webmaster email to make sure that automatic software updates are successful. Monitor email alerts about problems and troubleshoot them. Monitor website performance to make sure it is alive and reasonably responsive.

The webmaster should be experienced in managing the website provider, being able to login, interact with provider support staff, update settings, keeping DNS current and troubleshooting poor provider performance. Ideally the webmaster would be familiar with the CloudFlare caching service, which speeds up the website.

The webmaster creates content in the WordPress website on the behalf of the Historical Society President and other board members as needed. Content creation is simple to do and a manual is provided. And, Leonard will be glad to walk through the pages if there are questions.

Fort Chambers: A Call For Boulder To Reckon With Our History And Build Right Relationships With Indigenous Peoples Today

Throughout our country, people are assesssing how we memorialize our history, especially in regard to racial injustice and conflict. This is an immediate challenge – and opportunity – for the people of the Boulder Valley. The City of Boulder's Open Space and Mountain Parks (OSMP) department is considering how to develop the site of Fort Chambers, one of the staging grounds for the 1864 Sand Cree Massacre where 230 Arapaho and Cheyenne people were killed. Right Relationship Boulder is urging OSMP to implement the wishes of the tribal people and develop the property as a Site of Conscience. We are also urging both the City and the County to return more open space land to the tribes. – *Paula Palmer*

--- In the early 1800s, the eastern plains, at the foot of the Rocky Mountains, in what is now the Boulder Valley, was a homeland for Native American tribes. The Niwot area was the winter home for the Arapaho and some Cheyenne tribes. The entire Boulder Valley was the ancestral homeland of numerous Indigenous Peoples for decades. 1790 - 1800 – Arapaho and Cheyenne arrive after being pushed south from the Great Lakes region by the Sioux. 1803 – Haystack Mountain becomes property of the U.S. Government after the purchase of the Louisiana Territory 1820 – Major Stephen Long arrived and claimed that this land is the "Great American Desert."
